LEGAL CONDITION OF THE MEDITERRA NEAN

TRANSBOUNDARY MARINE PROTECTED AREAS IN THE MEDITERRANEAN: **LEGAL ISSUES**

The Mediterranean is puzzled of different legal regimes (each regime corresponds to a degree of powers that the interested States can exercise over them) and as a result, a marine protected area can have different legal status applying including the High seas regime.

The 1995 Protocol on Specially Protected Areas and Biodiversity in the Mediterranean organizes for the establishment of a Mediterranean network of protected areas in the High seas through a list of specially protected areas of Mediterranean Importance (SPAMI), inscribed by consensus of the Parties. However, support to the Protocol needs to be strengthened and issues of opposability of SPAMI to non-Barcelona States (as well as of other instruments to third Parties) will be of strong interest here.
